This past summer, Brock participated in the Summer Employment Program through Trehab in Tioga County, completing a Paid Work Experience (PWE) with the Southern Tioga School District's maintenance department. A dedicated and hardworking young adult, Brock balanced his job placement with evening EMT classes, all while continuing to serve as a volunteer firefighter in his community. Over the course of four weeks, he worked 30 hours per week with the maintenance team, where he quickly became invaluable.

In addition to his work experience, Brock completed 30 hours of Academic Enrichment activities. These included financial literacy, soft skills training, post-secondary exploration, and career-focused field trips in healthcare and criminal justice. Guest speakers, such as a local entrepreneur, shared their experiences, and Brock especially enjoyed the hands-on learning at Pennsylvania College of Technology's Wellsboro campus. There, he participated in a nursing student lab where he intubated cow lungs—an experience that left a lasting impression.

Brock's performance on the job earned him high praise from his supervisor, who shared, "Brock consistently arrived early and ready to work. He is a quick learner requiring little direction. Brock was a self-starter and able to complete tasks without much supervision. He was an ideal participant, and I can say with confidence, I could not have finished this summer without him." His outstanding work ethic and dedication also earned him the Youth Recognition Award, highlighting his success among peers.

Reflecting on his experience, Brock explained, "I stayed focused by dedicating myself to the task at hand; it would translate to me being dedicated to the job or patient." This mindset speaks directly to his long-term goal of becoming a paid firefighter and EMT—roles that require discipline, focus, and service to others.

When Brock returned to high school this fall, the Southern Tioga School District invited him to continue working with the maintenance department. He is now completing a morning PWE before classes, gaining further real-world experience and continuing to build a strong foundation for his future.

NTRPDC Wins 2025 Impact Award for NT Business–Education Partnership

In July, the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) named the Northern Tier Regional Planning and Development Commission (NTRPDC) as a 2025 Aliceann Wohlbruck Impact Award winner, in recognition of the Northern Tier Business–Education Partnership (NTBEP).

NTBEP was initiated by NTRPDC and the Northern Tier Workforce Development Board (NTWDB) to act as a conduit between schools and local businesses along with providing career education and exploration activities to students. The program provides career coaches to work in local schools with young people to promote awareness of occupations that are available in our region. In addition, coaches connect school districts with employers to assist in implementing activities to help students

realize these local workplace opportunities. Employers are able to discuss skills gaps with educators and administrators through these connections.

The NADO Impact Awards honor regional development organizations and their partners for strengthening communities, building regional resilience, and enhancing local economies through innovative approaches to economic and community development. This year's Impact Awards recognize 90 projects led by 79 organizations across 24 states. Winners will be honored during NADO's October 2025 Annual Training Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. All selected projects are featured in an interactive StoryMap that showcases summaries, images, and key partners. The map is available at www.nado. org/2025impactawards/.

"The Impact Awards are an annual reminder of the creativity and commitment that regional development organizations bring to their communities," said 2024–2025 NADO President Rick Hunsaker, Executive Director of the Region XII Council of Governments in Iowa. career coaches to its service
delivery team, the NTBEP has

Pepper. Cindy is working with the
Wyalusing Area School District,

and Jessica serves the Northeast Bradford School District and Towanda Area School District.

Career coaches provide valuable career awareness and career exploration activities to students in grades K-12 to help them become more aware of the opportunities available to them after graduation from high school. LAUNCH! Academic Enrichment Activity Serves Community in Wyoming County

Students from Wyoming County completed a successful Academic Enrichment week while participating in the Summer Employment Program this year. Not only did these nine students build important career development and life skills through workshops in the office, they were also able to take these abilities and apply them to real life.

After receiving financial literacy presentations from both Penn East Federal Credit Union and People's National Bank, students put these skills into action to give back to the community. Accompanied by their career advisor, the students traveled to Weis Markets, where they worked together to strategically select ingredients to make meatballs while keeping within a set budget. After the shopping trip, the students traveled to Seven Loaves Soup Kitchen to prepare and donate the meatballs for that night's dinner.

The students worked in groups of two to mix the ingredients, shape the meatballs, and place them on baking trays, while learning the importance of preparation, cleanliness, and respecting shared space. The students worked side-by-side with those who volunteer regularly, strengthening community connections and gaining insight into the importance of volunteer organizations.

This meaningful collaboration resulted in plenty of meatballs to feed the families that would rely on the Seven Loaves Soup Kitchen for a meal that night.

LAUNCH! Out-of-School Youth Success Story

Evan enrolled in the LAUNCH! Outof-School Youth (OSY) program in Fall 2024. A 2023 graduate of Mansfield University with a degree in Computer Science, Evan had never held a job before but was actively searching for full-time employment. As a young adult on the autism spectrum, Evan was eager to begin working and welcomed the structure and routine that employment could provide. With support from his career advisor, Evan developed a strong resume, connected with the university's career development office, and began applying to positions aligned with his skills.

One day Evan's career advisor received a call from Kingdom,

Inc., in Mansfield, which had just completed a large military glove shipping contract. The employer mentioned they had a variety of tasks remaining—some of which were computer-related—and were open to bringing someone new on board.

The career advisor immediately thought of Evan and shared his background. The employer was interested and requested an interview the next day. While Evan was eager for the opportunity, the speed of the hiring process caught him off guard. With encouragement from both his family and career advisor, Evan attended the interview and made a great impression. His career advisor

quickly completed the necessary paperwork and orientations with both the worksite and client, and Evan's Paid Work Experience (PWE) began the following Monday.

Since then, Evan has continued to thrive in his role, earning consistent praise from his supervisor. His journey is a powerful example of how timely support, encouragement, and opportunity can help a young adult take meaningful steps toward developing work skills.

In June 2025, Evan successfully completed his PWE and was hired full-time by Kingdom. He now works as a permanent member of their team, continuing to grow professionally and gain confidence in the workplace.

NTRPDC Manufacturing & Trades Career Camp

In June 2025, the Northern
Tier Regional Planning and
Development Commission
hosted a three-day career camp
for students in grades 6-9 from
Bradford and Sullivan counties. The
Manufacturing & Trades Career
Camp focused on increasing
students' awareness of careers
related to manufacturing, construction trades, and transportation,
and educating them about opportunities available in their home
communities with good wages and

projected openings for the future (i.e., High-Priority Occupations). It was the goal of this program to reach students before they enter high school and finalize their post-graduation plans, with the hopes of piquing student interest in manufacturing and trades occupations within the Northern Tier Region. In doing so, we build tomorrow's workforce, and our future communities and regional economy.

Mini-Touch-a-Truck

On the first day of camp, students participated in a mini-Touch-a-Truck event. B & K Equipment and Crane Service, Bradco Supply, and PennDOT each brought vehicles and pieces of heavy equipment for students to check out up close. Staff from each employer talked to students about the functions and use of each piece of equipment or vehicle, and allowed them to explore at will. Despite the heat, students enjoyed honking the horns and climbing into the driver's seats.

Presentations and Demonstrations

Camp also included daily occupational presentations, demonstrations, and workshops from Jeff Paul Heating, Plumbing & Electric; Global Tungsten & Powders; and Unity Lab. Students learned about various trade occupations, entrepreneurship, and the manufacturing environment and process. The morning workshops included

an introduction to reading blueprints and an overview of precision measuring.

Employer Field Trips

Each afternoon, students and staff went on field trips to local employers to hear about and see what they do firsthand. As part of their tour at Bishop Brothers Construction (Wysox Sand & Gravel), students and staff were taken to three work sites to see each stage of the process of manufacturing raw material into a finished product. On the second day of camp, students ventured to Claverack REC/Revolution Broadband to learn about how electricity and fiber broadband work. Students were able to see what happens when there are power lines down on a car, and how to splice fiber optic cables to fix an Internet outage. On the last day of camp, students, accompanied by Bradford County Commissioner Zackary Gates, toured Bradford County Sanitation in Burlington. In addition to seeing the wastewater

treatment tanks and learning about the process of restoring water to be released back into the creeks and streams, students also learned about the importance of water restoration and the impact dirty water and contaminants have on wildlife and quality of life.

Virtual Reality

At the end of each day, students returned to base camp for their favorite part of the day: VR time! Students used virtual reality headsets to explore various careers and complete job tasks related to the careers discussed throughout the week. For example, students were able to virtually weld a broken assembly line, climb poles to restore power to a town, and demolish an overpass using power tools and explosives!

NTRPDC Awards Nearly \$50,000 in Mini Grants to Promote Career Readiness

The grants impacted more than 1,500 students, 50 educators, 40 local businesses and organizations, and 250 families.

The Northern Tier Regional
Planning and Development
Commission (NTRPDC) funded
16 innovative career education
initiatives through Northern Tier
Business Education Partnership's
(NTBEP) 2024–2025 Mini Grant
Program. Nearly \$50,000 was
awarded to school districts across

the five-county region to support career awareness, exploration, and work-based learning opportunities for students in grades K–12.

This past school year, the program received 24 applications. The 16 projects selected for funding ranged from student participation in academic competitions such as Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) and the Science Olympiad, to industry tours, field trips, mentorship programs, classroom presentations, and hands-on work experiences. Participating school districts included Athens, Canton, Montrose, Mountain View, Northern Tioga, Sayre, Southern Tioga, Sullivan County, Susquehanna Community, Towanda, and Wellsboro.

Collectively, the grants impacted more than 1,500 students, 50 educators, 40 local businesses and organizations, and 250 families. Students engaged with a variety of industries and employers, while gaining essential workplace skills such as leadership, time management, teamwork, and communication. Project advisors across all districts reported positive outcomes and enthusiastic student participation.

The NTBEP Mini Grant Program will return for the 2025–2026 school year. In mid-September 2025, school administrators and teachers were invited to participate in a virtual information session to hear more about the next grant cycle and how to apply.



North Penn Liberty students completed the project "Gaming for Good" with their mini grant award. They worked with older adults in two long-term care settings and learned how games are used to promote physical, social, emotional, and intellectual well-being. They also learned about careers within the facilities as well as improving their verbal and non-verbal communication skills.

Students Learn about Options for 'What's Next?' after Graduation

Despite severe weather, a small group from the Northern Tier Region gathered at Montrose Area Jr/Sr High School on May 6, 2025, to learn about the career services available to young adults after high school graduation to help them decide, "What's Next?"

Paula Shoemaker and Kayla Record from Trehab discussed post-secondary education and training opportunities available to young adults through the Pennsylvania CareerLink® and Trehab. They also provided information on other career services available to young adults through the LAUNCH! program, such as resume writing, intensive job searches, and paid work experiences.

Jessica Price and Brooke Padavan from the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) discussed eligibility criteria and career services and support they provide to individuals with disabilities. Whether a person lives with a physical, mental, or intellectual disability, OVR can provide support to help individuals overcome barriers to obtaining and retaining employment. Services may include vocational guidance and counseling, job placement assistance, and assistive technology, to name a few. Jessica and Brooke also provided information on the Commonwealth Technical Institute (CTI) at the Hiram G. Andrews Center (HGAC) in Johnstown. CTI at HGAC is a school designed for individuals with disabilities where they receive supportive services such as occupational therapy on campus as part of their post-secondary education and training experience.

The Pennsylvania Apprenticeship Training Office (ATO), represented by TJ Warholic, also discussed their post-secondary education and training opportunities. Apprenticeships provide individuals with the opportunity to "learn while you earn," and they provide employers with a unique opportunity to develop their workforce. Apprenticeships offer individuals classroom education, on-the-job training, and mentorship along with a steady paycheck, increasing pay rate, and nationally recognized credentials.

The final presenter of the evening was Caleb Hoal from Interfaith of Susquehanna County. Interfaith is a Christian-based organization with locations in Montrose, Susquehanna, and Forest City. While Interfaith has a variety of community outreach programs, they also operate a thrift store where they provide on-the-job customer service skills training to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The What's Next? event was organized by Trehab and the Northern Tier Regional Planning and Development Commission in an effort to strengthen the workforce. The event was funded through the Twin Tiers ARISE Program (TTAP), which is federally supported by a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

To make this event accessible to all within the Northern Tier Region, it is held in a different part of the region each year. K-9 Officer's Presentation a Highlight of the LAUNCH! Summer Employment Program in Susquehanna County

The LAUNCH! Summer
Employment Program in
Susquehanna County had an
Academic Enrichment week that
was packed full of fun and learning
this summer. Five bright and engaged students got to know each
other over three days, attending
presentations and tours throughout
the area. One event that particularly interested the students was
a narcotics dog demonstration in
Ira Reynolds Park with Greenfield
Township Officer Justin Ezerskis.

Officer Ezerskis answered many questions, including, "What does

the training process look like?"
"What kinds of calls do you and
your dog respond to?" "What is
the process to become a K-9 officer?" One of the students already
planned to become a State Trooper
and was particularly inspired by the
presentation.

Following the Q&A, students had the opportunity to watch the dog in action. Officer Ezerskis set up a row of bags, one of which contained the scent of an illegal substance. The students witnessed the officer give the command, the

dog assess the scene, and the dog alert Officer Ezerskis to the correct bag. Next, Officer Ezerskis, armed with a protective sleeve, demonstrated how the dog is trained to attack a perpetrator. The students were impressed throughout the experience, and gained insight into the world of public safety and criminal justice careers. The presentation and demonstration with Officer Ezerskis was a memorable event that increased the students' respect for civic duty and community safety.

LAUNCH! Summer Employment Program Highlights from Bradford County

Bradford County Action worked with 22 youth this summer through the LAUNCH! Summer Employment Program. The students had Paid Work Experiences with various area employers:

- Nine participants worked at Canton School District; one will continue working there throughout the school year as part of the Northern Tier Career Center's (NTCC) Diversified Occupations program.
- Three were employed at NTCC—one in the office and the two others with the maintenance/custodial department.
- Two served at CHOP Out Hunger to help sort, organize, and bag food to help the local community.

- Two youth worked at Alparon Park, and were also hired by the Troy Fair to work during fair week.
- Two interns at BCA helped organize the Academic Enrichment (AE) Days, prepare materials for AE Days, and perform other related program assistance.
- Two participants worked at The Daily Review. One worked with the custodial/maintenance department helping prepare for a future building move. The second youth is interested in being a journalist and worked as a general assignment reporter for the paper, learning how to research, interview, and compile an article. After interviewing the Principal of Academic Affairs at Towanda Area School District, the youth wrote an article with minimal assistance that was published on the front page of The Daily Review July 23 edition. - One participant interned at Impact X Performance. He started college this fall to pursue a marketing degree. His duties at the gym included meeting weekly marketing goals, designing advertisements, and creating social media posts for community outreach. Impact X Performance continues to employ him on an as-needed basis to do marketing for the gym in Sayre as well as their other locations.
- One youth aspires to be an equine veterinarian, and worked at Rockin' N' Stables this summer. She learned all aspects of running a stable, from animal care to bookkeeping to maintaining the grounds.

The summer program included five Academic Enrichment field trips offering firsthand exposure to a range of careers. Sites included:

- Williamsport Bureau of Fire, to learn about careers in firefighting;
- Lycoming County Courthouse, with a tour of the courthouse and explanation of careers as well as attending several court hearings;
- Johnson College of Technology in Scranton;

- Steamtown Historical National Park; and
- PA CareerLink.®

Additional AE activities included:

- Learning about and using "soft skills;"
- Using virtual reality headsets to explore careers;
- A presentation by First Citizens Community Bank on bank accounts, writing checks, and related bank services;

- Hearing from two local small business owners about owning a business; and
- Learning about limited liability corporations (LLCs), including formulating a business idea and completing paperwork that would be required to create an LLC.

All the work experiences were successful and several youth workers qualified for a Worksite Recognition Award for outstanding attendance and workplace skills.

At the end of the summer, Zak reflected that while the shopkeeper role wasn't directly aligned with his long-term career path, the networking opportunities were invaluable. Those connections have already inspired him to start exploring new internship opportunities for 2026.

This experience shows how summer placements don't just provide a paycheck—they open doors, build confidence, and connect young people with opportunities that can shape their future.
